Press Release on Child Labour Survey, 2004: Main findings

40,300 are Working Child in the Palestinian Territory; of which 73% are employed to contribute to household economic needs

62% of households having working children prefer that their children to concentrate on study and education only

The Palestinian Central Bureau of Statistics has conducted a National survey about child labour in the Palestinian Territory during the period January 10th 2004 till March 5th 2004. The survey covered a sample of 10,334 households in the Palestinian Territory of which 8,603 households were interviewed and has at least a child aged (5-17) years.

Estimated population of children aged (5-17) years in the Palestinian Territory Mid, February 2004 was 1,313, 700 representing 34.9% of the total population.

Survey results showed that 40,300 children; 3.1% of children aged (5-17) years are workers (wage employee or unpaid family member), working children are distributed by 30,900 children employed in the West Bank and 9,400 in Gaza Strip.

Data showed that 72.8% of employed children are working to contribute to household economic needs; of which 49.5% for assisting in a household project, 20.7% to increase household income and 2.6% for other economic reasons, while 27.2% of the refer their work for social reasons; of which 14.5% for long school holidays and drop-out of school, 6.5% for self reliance and independent and 6.2% for other reasons.

Data showed that about two thirds (67.4%) of working children in the Palestinian Territory are unpaid family member (87.7% for working females, compared with 64.7% for males) While 28.2% are wage employee (8.7% for working females compared with 30.8% for males). The percentage of working children as unpaid family member among children aged (5-9) years was 98.0% of the total employed children of the same age.

Results showed that 42.7% of working children in the Palestinian Territory are working as agriculture skilled workers; of which 49.3% in the West Bank compared with 21.1% in Gaza Strip, followed by elementary occupations workers at 19.5%; of which 18.9% in the West Bank compared with 21.5% in Gaza Strip, while workers in services and market worker was 18.5%; of which 16.1% in the West Bank compared with 26.3% in Gaza Strip, and workers in crafts and other occupation was 16.6%; of which 13.5% in the West Bank compared with 26.9% in Gaza Strip.

47.4% of working children prefer to study only and not to work, while 24.9% stated that they prefer to work only, compared to 18.3% prefer to work and study, and 7.9% stated that they prefer to work during school holidays only.

Data showed that drop-out of school in the West Bank was 3.0% compared with 2.3% in Gaza Strip. Drop-out of school was mainly due to lack of desire to study at 32.9% of total dropped-out children, followed by poor economic situation at 10.5%.

Data showed that 25.8% of households having working children stated that their living level would decrease if the child stop working, compared with 50.9% will not be affected if their children stopped working.

Data showed that 61.7% of households that have working children prefer that their children to concentrate on study and education only, while 18.0% prefer that their children to work only, 15.4% prefer to completing study then start working, while 8.4% prefer that their children to work and study at the same time. 71.4% of households that do not have working children prefer their children to continue education only.

Concepts and Definitions

The main concepts and definitions used in this survey are based on the international standards taking into account the Palestinian labour market's circumstances.

Work:

Includes any activity for wage or salary, for profit or family gain, in cash or in kind. One hour or more of such activity constitutes work. Work also includes unpaid activity on a family farm or business.

Working Children:

All children aged 5-17 years who were at work at least one hour during the reference week.

Working children are classified according to employment status as follows:

1. Employer:

A child who operates his or her own economic enterprise or engages independently in a profession or trade, and hires one or more waged employees.

2. Own-account worker (self-employed):

A child who operates his or her owns economic enterprise or engages independently in a profession or trade, and hires no employees.

3. Employee:

A child who works for a public or private employer and receives remuneration in wage, salary, commission, tip, piece-rates or pay in kind.

4. Unpaid family member:

A child who works without pay in an economic enterprise operated by a related person living in the same household.

Occupation:

Occupation refers to the kind of work done during the reference period by the person employed, or the kind of work done previously if unemployed, irrespective of the industry or the employment status of the person. Occupations are grouped together mainly on the basis of

the similarity of skills required to fulfill the tasks and duties of the job. Occupations are classified according to the International Standard Classification of Occupation (ISCO 1988).

Industry:

Industry refers to the activity of the establishment in which an employed person worked during the reference period, or last worked if unemployed. This activity is defined in terms of the kind of goods produced or services supplied by the unit in which the person works. Industry activities are classified according to the unified commodity classification in the West Bank and Gaza Strip which is based on the International Standard Classification of All Economic Activities (ISIC Rev3).

Hours worked:

Total number of hours actually worked during the reference period as well as overtime and time spent at the place of work on activities such as preparation of the workplace. Leaves, meal breaks and time spent on travel from home to work and vice versa are excluded from work hours.

Daily wage:

Cash net wage paid to the wage employee from the employer. Wages received in different currencies are converted into NIS according to the exchange rate in the survey period
